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How to use this resource

The slides within this resource, although detailed, are designed to be used as a starting point for teachers to construct lessons around the language points that are explored here. The slides are intended to be used individually as a resource within a lesson and to be incorporated as part of instruction incrementally throughout the term to ensure that students have been exposed to all the language points in the coverage ahead of their end of term exam. Therefore, the PowerPoint should not be presented at a single event or in its entirety. Some functional language points may overlap with grammatical points in the coverage, and in that case, it is possible to combine slides. However, this resource should be considered to be a collection of individual slides that teachers can use to enhance students' learning. Within this document, you will find information about the coverage for this term. The lexis family that assessments will contain is mentioned as well as the particular grammatical and functional language points that will be tested in the exams at the end of this term. In the preparation sections, you will find examples and explanations for the grammatical and functional language points that will be assessed this term.

The grammar preparation section has an example sentence that illustrates the grammatical point. It follows this with an explanation of the meaning of the example sentence. Next, the specific grammatical structure used within the example sentence is detailed followed by an explanation of the circumstances under which the particular structure is used. More example sentences using the structure are given at the end of the slide.

In the functional language preparation section, there are examples of the particular language point followed by an explanation of how the particular are used. In the associated grammar section, language points that comprise the structure or can be used to in conjunction with the language point to express the stipulated function are detailed.

Term 1: Preparation – Grammar

سر الطيران

I <u>asked</u> my friend to go on a trip with me.
They <u>went</u> home after their mountain holiday.
My grandparents <u>were</u> late collecting me.

Meaning	You can state things that happened in the past.
Grammatical structure	Positive statements in the <u>simple past</u> . Positive: subject + simple past verb + object / subject + was/were + complement
Usage	We can use the simple past to talk about actions that happened. We can use it when talking about things that were true.
Other examples	He <u>rode</u> his bike to school. The museum <u>was</u> closed yesterday. My family <u>watched</u> a movie.

I <u>love going</u> to museums. Do you <u>like going into the desert</u> ? She <u>hates doing jobs around the house.</u>	
Meaning	To state or ask how someone feels about doing something.
Grammatical structure	Can use ' <u>like/hate/love' with the '-ing</u> ' forms of verbs. subject + like/love/hate + verb phrase gerund
Usage	We use 'like/love/hate + gerund form of the verb to say or ask how a person feels about doing something.
Other examples	She <u>loves studying</u> Arabic. Why do they <u>hate doing</u> chores? I <u>like running</u> with my friends.

Where did you go? How much did it cost? When did he arrive?	
Meaning	Asking questions to find out the place you visited, the amount of money paid for an item and the time someone came to a place.
Grammatical structure	Can ask <u>wh- questions</u> using the past tense of verbs. wh-question + did + base verb form
Usage	To find out when/where/why/who/what/how information about something or someone
Other examples	Why didn't they eat lunch? What did she do? Who did they meet?

Term 3: Preparation – Functional Language



Did you go on holiday this year? No, I didn't. I can't travel this year as I have exams. I could travel lots last year. Do you play sport? Yes, I am good at tennis. I used to be able to play football, but I can't play now.	
Functional language point	Talking about time periods (past / present)
Associated grammar	present simple, past simple, prepositions of time, noun phrases

Where would you usually go in the summer holidays when you were younger?		
We would usually visit the mountains and deserts in other countries.		
How did you people use to travel before aeroplanes?		
They used to ride camels many miles or go by boat across the sea.		
Functional language point	Describing past expriences and events	
Associated grammar	Past tenses – simple past, past continuous, phrases using 'would' and 'used to'	

I'm crazy about football. I'm really into collecting old coins.	I quite like eating pizza.
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I hate cold weather. I don't enjoy getting up early. I really don't like studying English!

Functional language point	Expressing likes and dislikes
Associated grammar	present simple, 'like/hate/love' with the '-ing' forms of verbs
