## Worm Tea

Worms may not be the cutest pets, but they can be very useful if you have a garden. You can build a worm farm where worms turn your food waste into a nutrient-rich liquid called 'worm tea', which is a fantastic fertilizer to boost your garden.

To make a worm farm, you will need a plastic water bottle with holes in the bottom. Put the bottle in a small bucket to catch the 'tea' that drips from the bottle. Note that the 'tea' should never be drunk because it is made from worm pee and other waste! And, because the 'tea' is very strong, it should always be diluted before being used to water the garden.


Worms like the dark, so you should keep your worm farm in a dark room, or cover it with a towel. Your worms will eat most of the food scraps you feed them, such as vegetables, tea leaves and even eggshells. But you should not give the worms any meat or dairy foods, as these will attract flies and make your worm farm smell. Also, avoid citrus fruits like lemons and oranges - these make the worms ill.
