

It was (at all - very - no) exciting, and the atmosphere was lively. The guide told us that Al-Ayyala has often been performed at celebrations like weddings and national festivals.

At the end of the visit, we (has - had - having) some time to walk through the souq. There were (many - much - so) stalls selling spices, perfumes, and souvenirs.

My cousin bought (much – a little - a few) bottles of oud, while I chose a small box of dates. Emirati dates are(extremely – no – never) delicious, and I (has always - have always enjoyed – have always enjoy) eating them with coffee.

By the time we left, we felt we had learned (so - no - be) much about the UAE's culture and traditions. The experience was not only educational but also (no - very - quiet) inspiring. I (sometimes think - think sometimes - sometimes) about how deeply connected Emiratis are to their heritage, and it makes me appreciate their efforts to keep these traditions alive.

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When I was younger, my grandmother (was telling – told – tell) me a traditional Emirati folktale that I (have never forgotten – have never – have never forgetting). It was about a fisherman who lived by the sea. He was known to be (at all – no – very) hardworking but quite unlucky. No matter how many (timing -times – time) he cast his net, he would catch only (a little – much - a few) small fish.

One day, while he (was fishing – fishing – fished), he (catch – caught – catching) an old, rusty jar.

At first, he thought it was worthless, but when he (open – opened- opening) it, a thick cloud of smoke rose into the air. The smoke formed into a powerful jinni who had been trapped in the jar for hundreds of years. The fisherman was (extremely- no – nice) surprised and quite scared because he had heard many stories about jinn being dangerous.

The jinni said, "I will (grant- granting – granted) you one wish, but only if you can answer my riddle." The fisherman listened carefully as the jinni asked,

"What has (so - very - no) beginning, no end, and cannot be seen?" The fisherman thought for a moment, then (replied-replying - was reply), "The sea." The jinni smiled and said, "You are wise. You may (had - has - have) your wish."

The fisherman wished for (a few - a little - quiet) luck in his life. The jinni granted his wish and disappeared into the wind. From that day on, the fisherman (always caught- caught always - always) many fish and became wealthy. He also shared his fortune with his neighbors, who said he was the kindest man in the village.

My grandmother (has told- have told – teld) me this story several times since I was a child, and I (really enjoy – enjoy really – enjoy so) it every time. It teaches an important lesson: wisdom and kindness can lead to great rewards. I (think sometimes - sometimes think- think always) about how folktales like this reflect the values of Emirati culture, emphasizing generosity and cleverness.

Now that I am older, I (has shared - have shared- have sharing) this story with others because I believe it's a part of our heritage that should never (was - being -be) forgotten.
