

The Town

"You will all rise for Judge Amir." The trial had begun. After several hard years, this small Indian town finally had an opportunity to stop the destruction of their community. Zahir, their lawyer, had only been practising law a few years but deeply appreciated their situation, coming from an agricultural family himself. Desperate to help, he had accepted a very low salary so as to enable the residents to afford the expense of the case. All things considered, Zahir viewed it as a tough but worthwhile challenge, although he was by no means guaranteed to win. The defence lawyer the company had employed was an experienced professional, and Zahir wondered if he had taken on more than he was capable of. On the first day of the trial, Zahir invited citizens to contribute evidence of the changes they had seen since the company began operating nearby. Traditionally a busy farming population, the fields and rice crops had decayed, which disrupted the farmers' lives and employment. The court sat silently until all witnesses had spoken about the toxic soil and the poisonous water that was creating poverty in the town. The company lawyer asked the witnesses some difficult questions, trying to discredit their stories. The judge looked stern and Zahir knew the battle was not over yet. At the start of the second day, Zahir spoke slowly. He had been reading long into the night so by the time he stood to address the judge, he was very tired. He had read carefully, so as not to miss the smallest detail. His priority as a lawyer was always to support people making an honest living. He presented photographs showing pollution caused by the company's factory. The company lawyer suggested that, taking the long view, the factory contributed to the economy and national wealth. However, Zahir proved that the bosses had failed to declare the potential negative impact of the operation so as to secure permission to build and run the factory. He explained, with passion and determination, how the company had ignored the town's protests. "You will understand," he said to the judge, who was listening intently, "that the company only thought about financial gain, which was irresponsible and harmful to nature and humans. When all is said and done, living things are far more valuable than money." Zahir felt sympathy for the factory workers, whose jobs would be lost, but stopping the pollution had to be the priority. As the company lawyer argued that the jobs the factory provided were essential for the town and provided materials crucial to the running of vital systems at a national level, the local people in the gallery murmured their disapproval. HOW 5G WILL AFFECT JOBS

5G is here, and it's one of the most life-changing technologies to come around in decades. The technology is even growing faster than initially thought, which means more businesses and individuals will have access to it in less time than we imagined. Consequently, there are a lot of big changes, and they're coming fast. Most of the discussion about SG focuses what effect it will have on how the world does business, or how consumers interact with technology. That

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includes a major segment of people who 5G may actually have the greatest effect on: Workers. 5G promises big changes in a lot of industries, and those changes can be seen at all levels of the chains of business. That especially means professionals that work with technology are all going to feel the effects of 5G.

Bill Menezes, an enterprise analyst, said that feeling the effects of 5G largely depends on the specific kinds of work you do. "5G is going to be much more transformative for some industries than others as different types of businesses will approach 5G in different ways," Menezes said. Take for example an automotive dealership: There, the mechanics may start using AR goggles to help with repairs. So now the IT person has to learn to support the actual goggles and the 5G cellular network they're connected to.

One of Menezes' biggest predictions for 5G is that we have to wait to really understand the ideal use of the technology. "When 4G came out no one imagined getting an Uber. It took familiarity with new technology before its most important uses appear," Menezes said. This familiarity is going to take some time because widespread use of SG is probably still five to seven years out. Private SG networks are already appearing for a variety of applications, and it's changing how some businesses operate. With novel, innovative uses of 5G still years off, knowing how 5G will transform work for the average tech or IT pro is hard to determine. That doesn't mean you can't prepare, though.

Menezes recommends spending some time learning about 5G infrastructure, as knowing how the new generation of wireless networks are built will make it easier to see where it can be applied for a particular use. He also recommends learning directly from 5G service providers, many of whom offer incubators, test environments, and other programs to learn about their networks. Another good idea is to study security. "5G will add a lot of new touch points to networks, and every one of them is a potential attack vector," Menezes said. Along with learning how to secure a 5G network, tech pros should also learn about data security. As businesses use of 5G grows and businesses start passing sensitive data over public connections, it will be increasingly important to know how to secure data in transit.

5G may have arrived, but don't panic: We have several years for all the business, work, and life changes it will bring. Just be sure to start preparing now so that you can be ready when the big 5G trend knocks

One of the first Hollywood film stars was the British actor Charlie Chaplin. Chaplin was born in London in 1889. He had a very poor and unhappy childhood. He left school when he was very young and worked in a number of jobs to survive. Then he started to perform in a variety theatre as a comic actor. In 1913 he emigrated to America because he wanted to be a film actor. He entered the film industry and invented the character of Charlie the Tramp (Chariot in Italian), a funny short man with a black moustache and a bowler hat. He was brilliant, and the comic character he created is still famous all over the world.

Chaplin made wonderful comedy films like The Golden Rush, City Lights, Modern Times and The Great Dictator. Almost all these films were silent, that is they didn't have spoken dialogues or a soundtrack, but subtitles helped to tell the story. A pianist sometimes played the piano too — fast music for the exciting parts and slow music for the sad parts.

By 1919 Chaplin was rich and he started the United Artists studios with some other famous Hollywood stars. He lived in the USA for many years, but the government didn't like his political opinions as they thought he was a socialist. So, in 1952, when Chaplin tried to return to the USA after a journey to London, the Americans did not allow him back. Then Chaplin decided to live in Switzerland until his death in 1977. He returned to the US only once in 1972 when received a special Oscar for his life's work. This was Hollywood way of saying sorry to one of greatest stars.
