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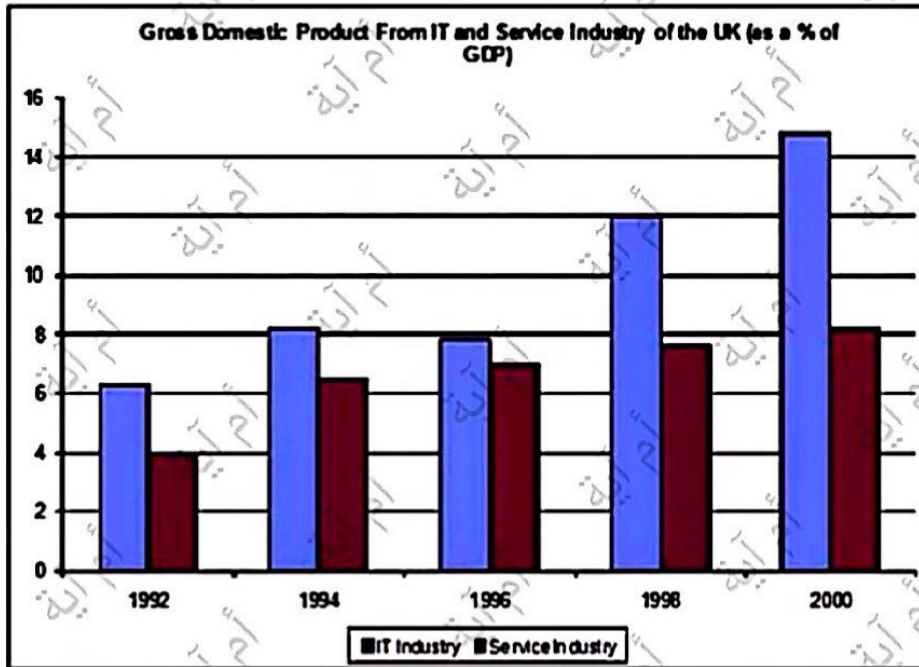

Analyzing a Bar / graph Chart (Lesson 7.4)

Gross Domestic Product in the UK



The bar chart shows the gross domestic product generated from the IT and Service Industry in the UK from 1992 to 2000. It is measured in percentages. It can be seen that the two industries increased, but IT remained at a higher rate throughout the time period surveyed.

At the beginning of the period, in 1992, the Service Industry accounted for 4% of GDP, whereas IT exceeded this, at just over 6%. In the next four years, the levels were more similar, for the two industries ranging between 6% and just over 8%. IT was still higher, but it fell slightly from 1994 to 1996.

However, over the following four years, the two industries were rather different. IT increased sharply to 12% in 1998 and then to nearly 15% in 2000, while the Service Industry stayed level, increasing to only 8%.

Overall, the percentage of GDP from IT was almost twice that of the Service Industry. The percentage of IT contribution in the GDP of UK grew steadily from 1992 to 2000 from about 6% to more than 14% while that of service industry grew from 4% to only 8%.

How to make Pasta

A-Introduction

6. Name and signature
