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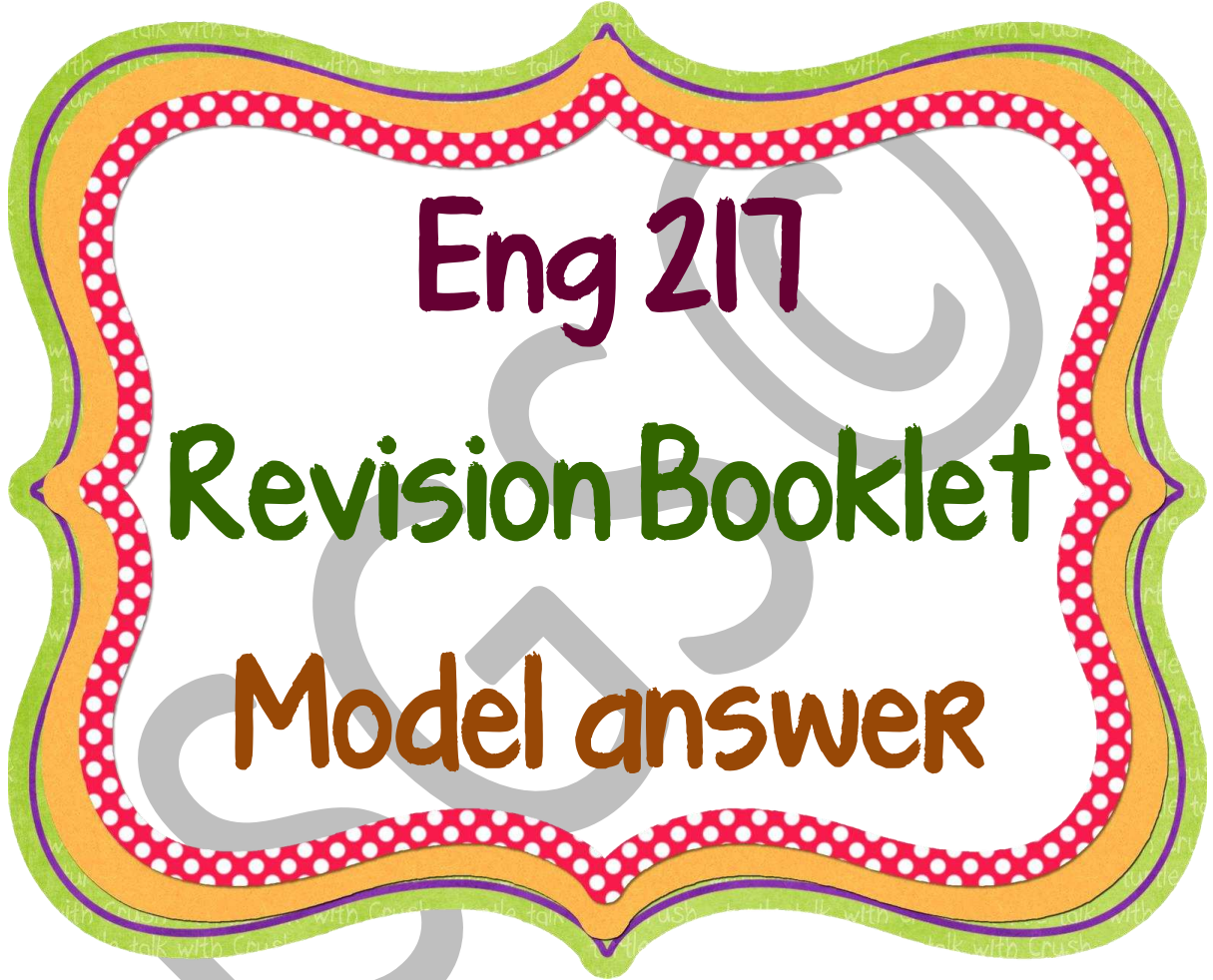

Central Park

Central Park, in Manhattan, is one of the **famous** places for people in New York to meet, 'hang out' and have fun. New Yorkers say that the park is their own 'front garden', where they can **relax** and escape from the **noise** of one of the busiest cities in the world. There are lots of things to do in the park. You can play games, go jogging, cycling, horse-riding, or rollerblading, or simply sunbathe on the grass. You can visit the Metropolitan Museum, and there's even a zoo! There are 58 miles of paths to explore, but don't worry if you get tired; you can have a rest on one of the 9.000 benches. There are **outdoor** concerts and plays and, if you want something to eat, there are some great restaurants. Central Park is well-known all over the world and around 25 million people visit it each year. It is considered a good family tourist attraction.

However, the park hasn't always been so popular. When it **opened**, in 1858, only rich people used it. **Poor** people said it was too **expensive** to get there. When transport became cheaper, the park became more popular and, in 1926, the **first** playground was built. But in the 1960s and the 1970s the park became **dirty** and **dangerous**, so people didn't want to go there. Then, in 1980, an organization called the Central Park Conservancy took control and everything changed. They spent million of dollars on the park. They planted trees and added a lot of **new** attractions. Now there are 21 playgrounds and there's even a skating rink. It costs 520 million a year to look after Central Park, but most people **agree** that it's worth it.

(1) Helen Adams Keller was born on 27 June 1880 in Tuscumbia, a small rural town in Northwest Alabama, USA. The daughter of Captain Arthur Henley Keller and Kate Adams Keller. Helen was born with full sight and hearing.

(2) Two years later Helen's life was to change dramatically, when she fell ill. The doctors of the time called it "brain" fever. This illness had left her both blind and deaf. By the time Helen was six; her parents became sad and desperate. The doctor advised **them** to take her to a special school.

(3) Anne Sullivan was the great teacher who changed Helen's life to the better. They meet each other for the first time on March 3rd, 1887. Anne provided not only help but also love and affection. Although at the beginning Helen was stubborn and strong headed, finally they got on well with each other. 'Water' was the first word that Helen understood. And on November 4th, 1891 Helen sent Michael Anagnos a birthday gift of a short story **she** had written called "The Frost King".

(4) Helen was also a gifted writer. She wrote fourteen books, many essays, articles and speeches on everything from her love of animals and nature to the importance of equal opportunities for women. She also believed that by helping others, you grow and help yourself.

(5) On June 1, 1968, at Arcan Ridge, Helen Keller died peacefully in her sleep. She left behind her ideas and dreams that will never die. She is still inspiring generations after generations. Her final words were: "I may be handicapped. However, I can live. Our world is big and beautiful."
