Reading 2: (15 marks)

Read the following story and then answer the questions that follow accordingly.

The Mystery of the Franklin Expedition

- A. Many years ago, explorers wanted to find a way by sea from Europe to China. In 1845, John Franklin left England with 134 men to look for a route through the Arctic.
- B. Franklin's ships had everything they needed. They had enough food in tins for three years and thousands of litres of lemon juice to stop diseases. They also had two libraries with 3,000 books, excellent maps, scientific instruments, musical instruments and a new **invention**: a camera.
- C. Franklin and his men left England on May 19th, 1845 and they sailed without problems across the Atlantic towards Canada. When Franklin arrived at Baffin Bay in July 1845, things were going very well for the **expedition**. On July 26th, some sailors saw Franklin's ships when they were entering the bay. That was the last time that anyone saw Franklin and his men alive.
- D. The British government became very worried when they heard nothing from Franklin. They sent expeditions to look for him, but the expeditions all returned without any news. The government **offered** £20,000 to anybody who could help Franklin or anybody who had information about Franklin. Nobody came with information.
- E. Then, in August, 1850 some sailors found the first signs of the Franklin expedition while they were **searching** on Devon Island: some old food tins, some papers, and, something very surprising, the graves of three men who died while Franklin was waiting in Baffin Bay for the ice to melt. But why did they die? The three men were all young and three deaths in the first months of the expedition was very **strange**. What happened to them? And where were the ships and all the other sailors? The mystery of the Franklin Expedition was growing stronger.....

Reading 3: (20 marks)

Read the following article and then answer the questions that follow accordingly.

A British Wedding

Weddings are important occasions in British life. They can be very expensive and take a long time to organise. There are also many traditional aspects of weddings that are important for people who get married. However, many traditions have become less common in recent years and marriage in Britain is changing.

Legal marriage is from the age of 18, but *this* can be lowered to 16 if the couple have their parents' permission. The average age of people who get married in the UK is 30. People can marry in a civil ceremony, at a **registry office** or other place of worship. All couples must sign a **marriage certificate**. This is a legal document which proves that they are married. Divorced men and women can remarry but this may not be possible in a church.

In the past, a traditional marriage in the UK meant a couple first got engaged. This was when the man formally asked the woman to marry him with a ring. It was also traditional for the **groom** to ask the **bride's** father if he agreed. The wedding commonly took place at the bride's local church with about a hundred guests. It was a tradition for the groom's father to buy the flowers but for the bride's father to pay for everything else. The two families sat on different sides of the church and the bride's father gave away *his* daughter to the groom. Female friends and family members helped her with her long dress and were called bridesmaids. The couple exchanged rings, and then signed the marriage certificate. When they left the church, guests threw paper confetti at them and took a lot of photographs. The guests then went to a hotel or restaurant for the wedding **reception** and *they* had a meal, made speeches and danced. The guests brought wedding presents for the couple's new home and the couple then went on a long holiday called a honeymoon. The new bride took her husband's surname.

These days, however, many people do not always follow tradition so closely. It is now common for the woman to ask the man to marry her, and not many men ask the woman's father for her hand in marriage. People frequently marry in a town hall. A few even marry on a beach in a hot country. The couple tend to pay for the wedding themselves but still expect both families to help them pay for the reception. These days not every woman wants to change her surname so she might keep her initial name or take both names.
