Unforgettable Journey




After four days, we reached a special area called Rainbow Canyon. It is a beautiful narrow valley and the rock is of many different colours. We rode in the early morning before it got too hot and then rested at midday.

On the fifth day, we stopped at an oasis. The camels drank huge quantities of water, not knowing when they could drink again. We put more sun cream on our pale skins. Then we were off again. I remember standing and watching one evening as the sun sank below the horizon. The Egyptian sun is much bigger than the European sun and it is considerably warmer. The Bedouin sang a song, a very simple song, 'The ship goes away. The ship comes back. The ship brings sugar and tea.' We joined in and sang with them as the stars came out and filled the sky with millions of tiny lights.

In total, we spent a week riding through the Sinai. We saw scorpions, lizards, snakes, and on one occasion a desert fox and a wolf. We slept under the stars - it was too hot to sleep in our tents. Now, back in Europe, when I see the stars at night I remember that trip to Egypt, the camp fire at night, the very sweet tea we all drank, and the simple but beautiful song, 'The ship goes away.
