A new study published in January 2020 suggests that robots can play an important role in the education of young people, but that they will never be able to replace 'real' teachers. Scientists believe that social robots could be effective in the teaching of certain subjects, such as vocabulary or prime numbers as children can write these down and the robots can be programmed to respond appropriately. However, robots have some technical limitations which are related to speech recognition and the ability to interact on a social level so they could never teach subjects such as listening or reading. This means that in the future they might only be able to serve as teaching assistants or tutors.

The study was led by Professor Tony Belpaeme from Ghent University, Holland. He has worked in the field of social robotics since 1999. He said: "For the past two years scientists have been building robots for the classroom--not the kind of robots that have been used to learn about technology and mathematics, but social robots that can actually teach. Social robots can become part of the educational system just like paper, white boards, and computer tablets. A social robot has the potential to support and challenge students in ways that are unavailable in our current resource-limited educational environments. The pressures on teaching budgets, in addition to calls for more personalised teaching on a one-to-one basis, have led to a search for technological solutions."

The current study involved a review of about 100 research articles published in scientific journals. It demonstrated that robots are effective at improving learning outcomes because of their physical presence. However, the study also explored some of the technical limitations associated with social robots like speech recognition, especially understanding young children's spoken utterances. It also made clear that introducing social robots into a school's curriculum would create significant logistical challenges and might pose some risks. For example, some children might rely too much on the robots rather than simply using them when they are in difficulty or face a challenge.

The study also highlighted the ethical issues associated with using robots in education. One issue raised was: 'How far do we want the education of our children to be controlled by machines?' Overall, learners' experiences were very positive, but parents and teaching staff still have some concerns.

To conclude, the use of robots in educational settings is limited by technical and logistical challenges. On the other hand, it is highly likely that classrooms in the future will feature robots whose primary role will be to assist the 'real' teacher.

Charles Dickens was born on February 7, 1812 in Portsmouth, England. Charles was the second oldest in a family of eight. His father, John Dickens, worked as a naval officer. However, the family's financial situation was not good because John Dickens used to spend more money than he had.

In 1824, when Charles was twelve years old, his father was imprisoned in the Marshalsea debtor's prison because he did not pay his bills. Consequently, Charles was forced to leave school and work in a warehouse that handled shoe polish to help support the family. This experience left a deep impact on Charles that remained with him for the rest of his life.

After a few months, Dickens's father was released from prison and Charles was allowed to return to school. At fifteen, he completed his formal education. He worked as an office-boy and studied shorthand at night. In 1830, he started working as a shorthand reporter taking notes in the courts and after that he worked as a newspaper reporter.

It was during this time that Dickens started writing short stories and essays which he sent to journals. *A Dinner at Popular Walk* was Dickens's first published story and it appeared in the *Monthly Magazine* in December 1833. A year later, he decided to use a different name when signing his books. He chose the word 'Boz'. Dickens's first book, a collection of stories titled *Sketches by Boz* was published in 1836. In the same year he married Catherine Hogarth and had ten children.

Although Dickens's main profession was as a novelist, he continued his journalistic work until the end of his life, editing *The Daily News* and *Household Words*. His connections to various magazines and newspapers gave him the opportunity to publish his own fiction.

Chapters from his novel *'The Papers of the Pickwick Club'* were published on a monthly basis in newspapers from April 1836 to November 1837. It became one of the most popular works of the time. After its success, Dickens began a full-time career as a novelist. He produced several novels: *Oliver Twist* (1837-39), *Nicholas Nickleby* (1838-39) and *The Old Curiosity Shop* were all published in monthly parts before being sold as books.

Charles Dickens died at home on June 9, 1870 after suffering a stroke. He wanted to be buried in Rochester Cathedral but instead was buried in the Poets' Corner of Westminster Abbey, London. His books have been translated into many languages and are still read today.
