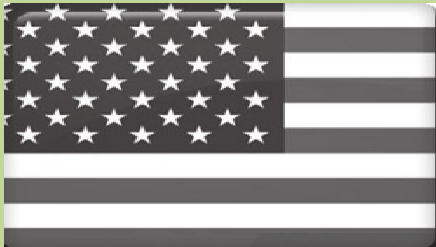

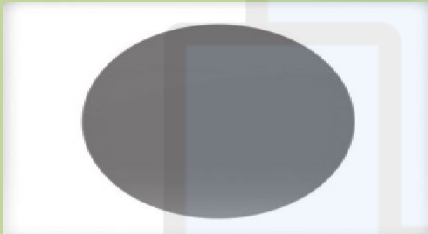

The law in Australia says that young people are adults at eighteen. That's when they can vote. No, not 'can' – they have to vote when they are adults - in Australia, it's the law. Young people can leave school at sixteen. and they can drive at seventeen. Australians can get married at sixteen if their parents agree



In the US, you can vote at eighteen and in most states you can drive at sixteen. The age at which you can do other things is different from state to state. In some states, for example, Arkansas, you have to stay at school until you're eighteen, but in other states like Alaska, you can leave school at sixteen. In most states, you can get married at sixteen if your parents agree. In California, you can marry at any age if your parents agree!



In Japan, young people can leave school at fifteen and drive at eighteen. The law in Japan says that people are adults at twenty. They have special celebrations then. Japanese people can vote when they are twenty. Girls can get married at sixteen. but boys have to wait until they're eighteen. I don't know why boys have to be older than girls
